Milestones Mark Memorial Day

Three unforgettable exploits by American WWII Veterans merit special remembrance this Memorial Day. The first occurred April 18, 1942 when 80 volunteers achieved unimaginable success by launching 16 B-25s from the deck of the USS Hornet on a daring and inspirational bombing raid over Tokyo. It was America's first offensive

strike since Pearl Harbor, and is widely credited with changing the course of the war. The psychological effect on both sides was profound.

First off the deck was their daredevil leader *Jimmy Doolittle*, an unflappable former prize fighter, acrobat, international air race champion, pioneer flight innovator, and Aeronautical Engineering PhD from MIT who was already larger than life, trusted by generals, and revered by his men. Suspicion that the carrier had been spotted forced lift off 300 miles further out than planned. All but one crew hit their target, inflicting minor damage but shattering Emperor Hirohito's claim of invincibility. All 16 planes were lost as they ran out of fuel attempting to reach China.

Of the 80 men who went on the mission, 60 survived the war. Two drowned off the coast of China and one died bailing out. The Japanese killed four of the eight they captured. One crew of five was held captive by the Russians for 13 months. Thirteen subsequently died in other theaters.

Doolittle feared he would be court-martialed for loosing his planes. Instead, he rose from major to general and was put in command of the 8th Air Force in Europe. An entire section of the Smithonian Air Museum is dedicated to the Medal of Honor winner. After the war, Doolittle began hosting annual reunion's for his Raiders. Eighty silver goblets, kept securely at the Air Force Academy, were ceremoniously brought by cadets to each reunion for toasts.

Their final toast took place November 9, 2013 at the USAF National Museum in Dayton, Ohio. The decision to end the tradition was made by the four remaining Raiders; *Dick Cole* (Doolittle's co-pilot), *Robert Hite, Edward Saylor*, and *David Thatcher*. French citizens cheered wildly on the Spring day in 1944 when *William Overstreet Jr.*, piloting a P-51C Mustang, chased his prey, a German ME 109, underneath the Eiffel Tower and shot it down. The American pilot's astonishing show of skill and bravery is credited with lifting the spirits of the French Resistance.

The incident began when Overstreet followed an ME 109 after it left the bombers he was escorting. A running dogfight ensued, resulting in a hit to the Messerschmitt's engine. It's pilot sought protection from anti-aircraft artillery by flying low over Paris. Still in hot pursuit, the Mustang took some hits around 1500 feet. Surprisingly, the German aimed his smoking fighter directly at the Eiffel Tower. Undeterred and taking intense enemy flak, Overstreet followed the desperate German between the tower's legs, firing furiously until the wounded warbird finally went down.

Artist *Len Krenzler* immortalized Overstreet's feat. The wartime Mustang pilot became an accountant, and in 2009 received the



French Legion of Honor. Bill Overstreet died December 29, 2013 at the age of 92.

Glenn McDuffie was changing trains on August 14, 1945 when he learned that Japan had surrendered. "I was so happy. I ran out in the street," recalled the then 18-year-old on his way to visit his girlfriend. "And then I saw that nurse. She saw me hollering and with a big smile on my face. I just went right to her and kissed her. We never spoke a word. Afterward, I just went on the subway across the street and went to Brooklyn."

McDuffie's magic moment in Times Square on V-J Day was famously captured by Life Magazine photographer *Alfred Eisensteadt*. As a civilian, McDuffie was a semipro baseball player and mail carrier. He died March 9, 2014 in Dallas at age 86. Eisensteadt's photo of McDuffie and that nurse will live forever as an icon of American history.
