Dewey Fries Goes to Washington

"It was the trip of a lifetime!" exclaimed Post 178 member **Dewey Fries** as he was being greeted by literally hundreds of people at DIA welcoming him back home from *Washington D.C.* It was the culmination of a trip to visit Veterans memorials and America's monuments.

Three days earlier, Dewey and 27 other WWII and

Korea Veterans were the first to board a Southwest 737 that took them From DIA to Baltimore, Maryland, accompanied by an equal number of "Guardians" ready to assist the Vets in any conceivable way during the journey.

A huge crowd greeted them at the Baltimore airport. People cheered, applauded, shook their hands, and thanked them for their service as they walked through the concourse to a bus that took

them to their rooms and a 6:00 p.m. dinner banquet at the *Hilton Hotel*.

Breakfast was at 6:00 a.m. and the tour bus departed at 7:30 for the hour-long drive to D.C. First stop was the *WWII Memorial*, with the bus driver serving as a very informative tour guide. The entourage moved on to the *Naval Memorial* then visited the *Lincoln Memo-*

Dave remembers deplaning at DIA and overhearing someone say, "Here they come." A loud round of applause and cheers erupted from hundreds of people gathered inside the terminal to greet the returning *Rocky Mountain Honor Flight Veterans*.

rial, Korean War Memorial, and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The day's final stop was the Washington Naval Shipyard, then it was back to the Hilton in time for another fantastic dinner.

Arlington National Cemetery was the destination on day two where the group watched the Changing of

the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns from a special viewing area, and participated in a wreath-laying ceremony. Dewey was selected to be one of four Vets to step forward and present the wreath.

The Air Force Memorial was next on the itinerary followed by the Marine Corps Memorial. After lunch at China Garden, they visited the FDR and Martin Luther King Memorials. Then it was time to board the bus and

drive to the airport for the flight back to Denver.

The Vets were whisked through security and were again greeted by a cheering crowd on the concourse. Before boarding the airplane the gate attendant used the intercom to lead everyone gathered around in singing "God Bless America."

Waiting for them at DIA was the largest crowd yet. Well over 200 people had gathered inside the terminal. Bag pipes played, cheerleaders cheered, and active duty service members saluted the Vets as they walked slowly through a long line of people on both sides applauding them. It was an emotional moment for the Vets and Guardians that brought tears and hugs.

"Anyone who can go on an *Honor Flight* should," concluded Dewey. "They treated us like royalty. We had everything we needed. Nate was my Guardian, and he was terrific. All the people at DIA was a real surprise."

We would like to welcome back Legionnaires Mike Watson and Bob Shiflet, and we have a new Rider member of the Auxiliary, Pauline Walls.


SAL REPORT Steve Stroud

Big Gun Joins Post 178

*M27 105mm, breach-loaded, single-shot, man-portable, crew-served, recoilless rifle.*Now on display under the U.S. Flag in front of Post 178 is a Korean-





era artillery weapon donated by disbanded *Denver Post 84*. The Riders moved the over 350 pound recoilless rifle to its new location on October 31st.

Development of a 105mm recoilless rifle began in 1944, was halted in 1947, and revived in 1950. M27 recoilless rifles saw extensive use as anti-tank weapons firing fin-stabilized. high-explosive rounds during the Korean Conflict. M27s have also been used to trigger controlled avalanches in the United States.
