USS American Legion (1919—1946)

After inspecting the hull of an Army troop ship being constructed at Camden, New Jersey, maritime official and member of the newly formed American Legion, William J. Brown, proposed a name change for the vessel at the organization's Pennsylvania Conference. The resolution passed only one week before launching, but publicity was favorable and on October 11, 1919 a U.S. Senator's wife christened the ship "American Legion."

The end of WWI obviated the need for new troop ships, so the American Legion was completed as a passenger-cargo vessel and modified for tropical service.

Munson Steamship Line bought it for \$1 million and began promoting fast passenger service (11 days) to South American ports. Round trip fare from New York to Rio cost \$450. National and regional officials of The American Legion were guests at a gala dinner aboard the ship prior to its maiden voyage to South America on July 23, 1921.

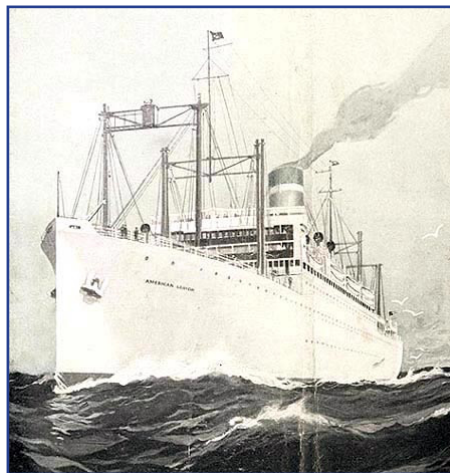
Munson fell into foreclosure in 1939 and the American Legion was laid up. It was rescued by the War Department shortly after Hitler invaded Poland, and converted to a troop transport.

After completing five voyages to Panama in 1940, President Roosevelt directed the American Legion to leave New York immediately for Petsamo, Finland and return with the Crown Princess of Norway and other dignitaries, "plus as many Americans as can be accommodated as they may not be able to return safely in any other way." Among the refugees was a young Danish musician destined for fame in America named Victor Borge. All were fleeing in the wake of Finland's

incredibly heroic but ultimately hopeless wintertime defense from Russian invasion.

The ship, crowded with over 900 aboard, found its way solo through heavy seas mined by both Russians and Germans before reaching New York twelve days later, escorted the final leg by two Navy destroyers.

Transport duties resumed until the ship was acquired by the Navy in August, 1941 and its white Army livery replaced by somber gray. An overhaul was completed in January, 1942. In April, the USS American Legion sailed through the Panama Canal bound for the Pacific.



The USS American Legion was awarded two Battle Stars for meritorious service in combat during WWII.

The vessel proceeded to New Zealand where it was augmented with 20-mm anti-aircraft cannons and selected for participation in the invasion of Guadalcanal, the first offensive landing in the Pacific. The American Legion and USS Fuller were the first ships to put troops ashore on August 7th.

The ship then joined the invasion fleet to repel air attacks. On August 8th a strafing enemy Mitsubishi sprayed machine gun fire across the deck, killing one sailor. Simultaneously, the American Legion's guns brought down the attacker.

The ship returned to the U.S. on December 8, 1943 having traveled 95,680 miles since leaving New York. After repairs, it completed a second tour in the Pacific Theater before spending the duration of the war in San Diego in a training capacity.

On March 28, 1946 the USS American Legion was decommissioned in Olympia, Washington and the name struck from the Naval Vessel Register. On February 5, 1948 it was sold for scrap.

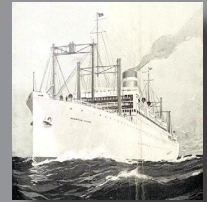

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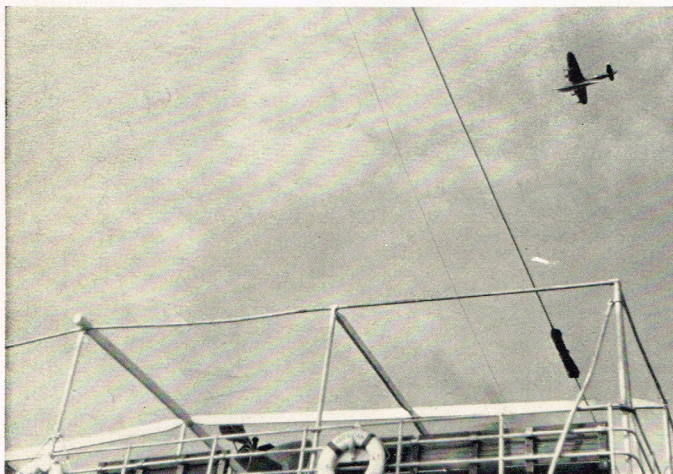

"AMERICAN LEGION" DOCKS WITH ROYAL AND PLEBEIAN REFUGEES

Last week the war-tossed U. S. Army transport *American Legion* tied up safe and snug at a Brooklyn pier after a jittery twelve-day voyage from Petsamo, Finland. Aboard was a grab bag of 870 war refugees, mostly Americans. There was Crown Princess Martha of Norway and her children coming to the U. S. as guests of the President. There was Mrs. "Daisy" Harriman, U. S. Minister to Norway, five Lithuanian girls in native costume, four shapely vaudeville skaters, several Latin-American diplomats and one Finnish girl stowaway.

The ship was crammed. People slept on cots in the holds and in the brig. The ship had slithered through a 15-mile-long Russian mine field off Petsamo when Berlin warned the *Legion* to shift her course to avoid German mines off Scotland. Undaunted, Captain B. E. Torning stuck to his course, set by the U. S. State Department, and slipped his ship past the mine fields in a 45-m. p. h. gale. The Nazi radio also beat a gruesome propaganda tattoo that the *Legion's* passengers were starving. That night the "starving" passengers had purée of peas, roast-beef hash, eggs, salad, stewed fruit, cheese and real coffee for dinner.



A British plane patrolling the seas to the north of Scotland passed low over the *American Legion*. The pilot could be seen waving "hello" and he dipped the wings of his big four-motored plane in salute.



With President and Mrs. Roosevelt, Crown Princess Martha and two Princesses saw Duchess County Fair Aug. 29. They are Hyde Park guests.



Crown Princess Martha of Norway and little Prince Harald, 3, arrived at Petsamo with the Finnish colonel (in uniform) who was credited with having killed 40 Russians during war.



The royal suite wore lifebelts like everyone else while ship was in Nazi mine fields. Left to right they are: a maid, Crown Princess Martha, the butler, Princess Ragnhild, a governess.



Mrs. Daisy Harriman, brave 70-year-old U. S. Minister to Norway, chatted with Captain Torning on deck during the difficult trip. She had Viking, a Norwegian elkhound and Bart,

an English cocker spaniel, with her. She played bridge every night. The youngster (right) who tired of having his picture taken and grimaced instead is a Danish-American refugee.



Women passengers slept on cots in the hold. The two blonde American girls belong to a roller-skating team which performed before Hitler in Germany and was later marooned in Norway.



Passengers ate in three sittings, passed most of the food themselves as there were only 17 waiters. Diplomats on board ate in a separate dining room, Norwegian royalty ate alone.

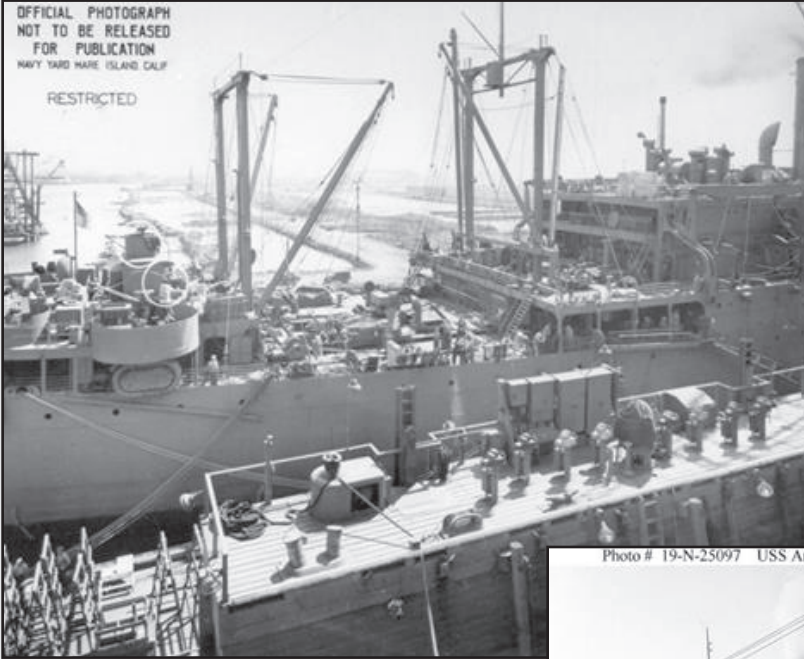
